
MESSAGE

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FOREWORD

During the last four and half years, the State Government has strived for improving the higher education sector by emphasising the three Es: expansion, excellence and equity. On all three counts, we have achieved the milestones we set out for ourselves. Of late, we have added another E, i.e. employability.

In terms of expansion, our approach has been that while private investment in higher education is welcome, increase in public funding by the State is indispensable, to ensure a balanced and holistic development of higher education that is not only of high quality but also affordable and accessible to all.

The Higher Education Department's Plan budget (State core plan) quadrupled in the last four years, showing the Government's serious resolve to build higher education infrastructure at a rapid pace. In the last four and half years, thirty one Government colleges have been set up besides fifteen Government-aided colleges. Of the fifteen new Universities set up in the last four and a half years, seven are State-funded and have come up in the under-served areas of the State.

We have also undertaken what could be described as the largest single recruitment exercise in our State's higher education sector. A total of 2,883 Assistant Professors and 126 Principals were recruited through the West Bengal Public Service Commission and the West Bengal College Service Commission, and appointed in the State's Colleges.

Another reform that we can legitimately take pride in is that all admissions at the under-graduate and post-graduate levels in the State-funded higher education institutions were made online, from the academic session 2015-16. This was a major e-governance initiative to bring in greater transparency and fairness in admissions, and benefitted more than eight lakh applicants who were able to avoid the sun and rain, and could apply for admissions from the relative comfort of their homes and neighbourhoods.

The transformation of the State's higher education has just begun to unfold. The story of the good work undertaken by the Higher Education Department needs to be told, and hence this Document.

I compliment all the officials and staff of the Department of Higher Education and Directorate of Public Instruction for their efforts and hope that they will continue to work with the same zeal and focus in the days ahead.

Foreword

These are happening times for the State's higher education sector. Through a large number of policy reforms and a significant increase in public spending, the State Government has vastly expanded higher education while also addressing quality issues. The work done in the last four years speaks for itself. To mention just a few—

- Fifteen new universities were set up. Of these, seven are State-aided and eight private universities.
- Thirty one new Government Colleges and 15 Government-aided colleges were set up.
- As a result of the huge expansion in higher education, the State's Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER), which was 12.6 in 2011, rose dramatically to 17.5 in 2015.
- The annual expenditure under the Plan budget of the Higher Education Department went up from ₹111.74 crore in 2010–11 to ₹471 crore in 2015–16; a more than 400% increase over four years.
- The West Bengal State Higher Education Institutions (Reservation in Admission) Act, 2013 was enacted with a mandate to provide a 17% reservation for OBC students. In 2014–15, the very first year of implementation, a total of 59,612 OBC students were admitted, which was 10.6% of all students admitted in the State's undergraduate and postgraduate courses.
- To improve the quality of teaching, 1,545 teaching posts, 43 posts of Officers and 1,022 non-teaching posts were created in the State-aided universities, Government Colleges and Government-aided Colleges.
- A total of 2,883 Assistant Professors and 126 Principals were recruited and appointed in the State's Colleges. Another exercise for recruiting 3,000 Assistant Professors through the College Service Commission is on. This is easily the largest single recruitment drive in higher education in the State's recent history.
- Admissions to all undergraduate and postgraduate courses in all Government and Government-aided higher education institutions were made online from the academic session 2015–16.
- The salary accounts of all universities and colleges were made online with funds being transferred directly into the beneficiary's account. Fund allocation from the Government was done through the e-bantan and e-pradaan softwares. e-Tender/e-Procurement in the higher education institutions was made mandatory for any procurement above ₹5 lakh.
- GIS mapping was completed for all higher education institutions in the State.

- As many as 24 Bills were placed before the West Bengal Legislative Assembly and passed, indicating the high level of reforms and enactments undertaken by the Higher Education Department.
- New Recruitment Rules were framed for the posts of Principal, Professors, Assistant Professors and Librarians in Government Colleges and Government-aided Colleges.
- The State's first Hindi-medium General Degree College at Banarhat, Jalpaiguri started functioning in August 2014. For the first time, Santhali was introduced as a subject in the State Eligibility Test (SET) conducted by the West Bengal College Service Commission.
- The West Bengal State Council for Higher Education was repealed and constituted afresh based on a new legislation, to significantly enhance the Council's powers and functions.
- The Librarians of Government Colleges and Librarians/Assistant Librarians/Deputy Librarians of Government-aided Colleges were conferred with Teaching status, along with all the attendant financial and service benefits, including Career Advancement Scheme and leave encashment up to 300 days.
- The leave encashment of Principals and whole-time teachers of Government-aided Colleges at the time of superannuation was enhanced to 300 days. The Graduate Laboratory Instructors (GLIs) were conferred with Teaching status, along with the attendant financial benefits, including Career Advancement Scheme.
- A long-pending demand of the hostel and mess employees of State-aided Universities and Government-aided Colleges was granted when they were conferred with Group D/non-teaching employee status with the attendant benefits of pension, GPF, encashment of leave salary etc.

The above illustrations are only a thin slice of the huge amount of work done in the last four years; the details can be glanced through the pages that follow. We have purposely emphasised pictorial documentation; after all, a good picture is worth a thousand words.

I thank all the officers, staff of the Department of Higher Education and its Directorates, for their untiring efforts at improving things. It is difficult to name so many individuals, so a huge 'thank you' to all the members of the team! A synergy among the Department, its Directorates, the State's universities and colleges has been built up, which has made this huge work possible in so short a time. We move ahead with the vision of establishing West Bengal as a higher education hub.

Though an effort has been made to maintain factual accuracy, any errors, typological or otherwise and omissions may please be brought to our attention.

Historically, as the capital of British India, Kolkata was the first to develop a modern system of education. It was here that in 1784, Sir William Jones, a well-known philologist of his time, established the Asiatic Society for the promotion of Oriental Studies. Missionaries and savants such as Ram Mohan Roy, David Hare, Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar, Shashi Bhushan Chatterjee and William Carey spearheaded the establishment of modern education in the city.

Calcutta University was one of the first universities to be set up in India (1857) as was the first medical college. Hindoo College (later called Presidency College) was set up in 1817; in 2010 it was conferred the status of a University. The National Council of Education, Bengal later became the Jadavpur University in 1955. The Visva-Bharati University at Santiniketan, founded by Rabindranath Tagore in 1939, is today a Central University.

Missionary efforts in the spread of higher education in Bengal are well known. In 1860, St Xavier's College, named after St Francis Xavier, a 16th century missionary to India, was set up. Affiliated to the University of Calcutta, it became the first autonomous college in the State in 2006. St Xavier's College is poised to become a full-fledged University soon. With about 4,000 students today, St Xavier's College is expanding to another campus in New Town. Other missionary colleges in the state include Scottish Church College, Serampore College, St Paul's etc.

Bengal has always ranked high as a pioneering state in promoting women's education. Established in 1879, Bethune College ushered in a new era of enlightenment for the women of the 19th century. Loreto College, Kolkata, is another institution of higher learning established for women in 1912.

Advances were also made in the field of science and technology. The Bengal Engineering College, Shibpur was founded in 1856. At the time, it was only the second such institution in all of British India. It was taken over by the Government of India and renamed the Indian Institute of Engineering Science and Technology, Shibpur in 2014 and today serves as a premier national institution for research and education in engineering, science and technology. IIT Kharagpur is the oldest IIT in India and has been ranked among the top 100 institutions in the world by Quacquarelli Symonds (QS) Graduate Employability Rankings while the Indian Institute of Management, Calcutta has consistently ranked as one of the three premier business schools of the country.

There were many colleges in and around Kolkata that were noted for their contribution to what came to be popularly regarded as the Bengal Renaissance of the 19th century—Chandernagore College (1862), Krishnanagar Government College (1846), Krishna Nath College, Murshidabad, Government College of Art and Craft (1864), Lady Brabourne College (1939) and so on. Sanskrit College, established in 1824 is one of the oldest educational institutions in India specialising in the study of Sanskrit, Indian languages and Indological Studies. Recently, it has been upgraded into a university aimed at revitalising the study of Sanskrit in the state.











Walking the Talk on Resource Allocation

The State Government has walked the talk and has substantially increased the budgetary outlays for higher education over the last four years. In fact, under the Plan head, the increase is as much as 400% in four years. The State Government believes that while private investment in higher education is unavoidable and welcome, the State must continue to pump public funds into higher education so that quality higher education remains affordable and accessible for all.



Harnessing GIS Technology for Planning

The huge increase in public spending in higher education has meant a rapid increase in the number of HEIs in the State, especially in the unserved and under-served areas.

Consider the figures: Till 2011, the State had set up 36 Government Colleges.

In the last four years, the State Government has set up 31 new Government Colleges (of which 28 are already functional) and 15 Government-aided colleges (of which 14 are functional). This exponential growth in the number of Higher Education institutions in West Bengal in the last five years is demonstrated in the table alongside—





Creation of New Posts

- The West Bengal College Service Commission has undertaken the task of recruitment for **2,261 posts** of **Assistant Professor** and **Librarian** in the State's Government-aided colleges; till date, **1,907 posts** have been recommended to the respective colleges and the process is complete. The West Bengal College Service Commission is also engaged in the process of recruiting **Principals** for **215 vacant posts** in Government-aided Colleges. By March 2015, **126 posts** have been recommended.
- The West Bengal College Service Commission has recently started the process of recruitment for another **2,000 posts of Assistant Professors** and **100 Principals** in the State's Government-aided colleges.
- A large number of teaching and non-teaching posts have been created by the present Government in the domain of higher education:
 - The West Bengal Public Service Commission took filling up of vacancies of **Assistant Professors** of different faculties in various General Degree Colleges (some of them are newly set up), BEd Colleges and Government Physical Education Training Colleges Training Colleges under WBES. Three advertisements have been published so far by the West Bengal Public Service Commission for recruitment of a total number of **1,149** (including **12 posts** meant for the newly set up Hindi Medium Government College at Banarhat Jalpaiguri) such vacancies. The process is on and the Commission has recommended **937 candidates** for appointment till date.
 - The West Bengal Public Service Commission also took up filling **235 vacancies of teaching positions** in different Government Engineering and Technical Colleges. Till December 2015, **41 candidates** had been appointed.





Admission Applications to UG and PG Courses made online

For the first time, in a major e-Governance initiative, all admissions to all UG and PG courses in the State's State Funded/Aided colleges and universities were made online in the academic session 2015–16. This rendered the admission process more transparent, merit based and completely hassle-free for the applicants as they could apply from the comfort of their homes or neighbourhoods, obviating the physical hardship of visiting different institutions in the hot and humid summer season. Fees were deposited at linked banks, avoiding cash transactions at the colleges and universities. This has benefitted more than 8 lakh students in the State.

Toll-free Helpline

A toll-free helpline for admission related queries for UG and PG courses with provision for SMS to dedicated mobile numbers has been introduced from the 2014–2015 academic session onwards. This helpline, run by the Higher Education Department between June and September, guides students seeking admissions in any UG or PG course in the State's higher educational institutions. The helpline has proved to be immensely popular, going by the thousands of queries and grievances received and addressed.




Software Adopted






Financial assistance to Students

The State Government has renamed the West Bengal Merit-cum-Means Scholarship Scheme for providing financial assistance to the poor but meritorious students of the State pursuing higher studies at various post-Madhyamik levels as the Swami Vivekananda West Bengal Merit-cum-Means Scholarship Scheme in commemoration of the 150th Birth Anniversary of Swami Vivekananda. THE WEST BENGAL UNIVERSITY OF TEACHERS' TRAINING,

An Act to provide for the establishment and incorporation of a University for promoting teachers' training, educational planning and administration in the State of West Bengal and to provide for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

The Kolkata Gazette

WHEREAS it is necessary to promote the creation of a centre of excellence in the field of teachers' training, education planning and administration and its allied disciplines;

AND WHEREAS it is necessary to improve the quality of education imparted by the existing teachers' education and training institutes and other similar institutes in West Bengal;


West Bengal State Council of Higher Education

The UGC in 1988, recommended formation of a Higher Education Council for State level planning and coordination of Higher Education. Following this recommendation, the West Bengal State Council of Higher Education was established on 29 July, 1994 under the West Bengal Act XXXVII of 1994 with the Minister-in-Charge, Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal as ex-officio Chairman. The council has been functioning since April 1995. Recently, the Act was amended in 2015 to give the Council a bigger mandate, to confer on it executive powers rather than just a recommendatory and supervisory role. The Council has been expanded and reconstituted in December 2015 to make it a more empowered body in the realm of higher education.



West Bengal College Service Commission

The West Bengal College Service Commission came into existence in 1978 in terms of Act LXII of 1978 for selection of Teachers and Principals for Government-aided colleges excepting those which are declared as minority institutions. To confer greater autonomy and accountability on the Commission, a new Act was enacted in 2012 (West Bengal Act XXIX of 2012) after repealing the Act of 1978. The West Bengal College Service Commission Act, 2012 has come into force. The Commission has been assigned with the responsibility of conducting State Eligibility Tests, selection of Librarians for colleges and also selection of non-teaching staff at the colleges.




West Bengal State Book Board

Kothari Commission recommended the teaching-learning at the university level through regional languages up to the university level. Accordingly, State Book boards were established to publish books in regional languages so that this switch to regional languages could be implemented. West Bengal State Foundation for Text Books was established as a registered society under Registration of Societies Act. It was later renamed West Bengal State Book Board in 1972.

The primary objective of this Board is to produce books in Bengali for undergraduate and postgraduate students of different disciplines studying in universities in West Bengal.

The Board has so far published 750 titles. Since May 2011, the Board has published 137 titles (49 new and 88 reprints) and has also published Higher Secondary level books in 6 disciplines.

Directorate of State Archives of West Bengal

History

Growing out of the Secretariat Record Office, the West Bengal State Archives, the first in whole of South Asia, came into existence in 1910 under the control of the Home Department. In tune with modern principles, this massive repository of official documents, preserved essentially for administrative reference, was opened to unofficial access—with scholars and information seekers from various walks of life allowed to consult the records.

Despite a great many records having been transferred to the National Archives in Delhi, this institution remains a treasure trove for researchers (both Indian and foreign) working on colonial and even post-colonial India. From its first holding of Select Committee Reports going back to 1858, it has records till the 1960s.

In 1952, the control of the Record Office passed to the Education Department and in 2009 the Archives received the status of a Directorate, an event that stimulated substantial increase in Archival activities that inter alia include exhibitions, publications, digitisation, and collaboration with other archives, both Indian and foreign.

Earlier, the Archival records were spread across three buildings—the Historical Section was located in the building at 6 Bhawani Dutta Lane, Kolkata, the Current section at Writers' Building, and the Photo Archives, PWD and IB records in the New Functional Building at 43 Shakespeare Sarani, Kolkata. Recently however, with the Government decision to turn the Writers' Building into a heritage site, bulk of its holdings has been transferred to the Building at Bhawani Dutta Lane. This development has been very convenient for scholars, who now find both historical and current sections in the same premises.





Functions and Recent Activities

The four primary functions of the Archives are:

- To scientifically preserve records in its custody.
- Give the various wings of the Government and researchers and scholars access to its archival holdings.
- To issue certified copies of records, including the electoral rolls and the Bengal Gazette to information seekers. This function, earlier discharged from the Writers' building wing, is now carried out at the Shakespeare Sarani office.
- Lately, the Archives have actively taken up digitisation. It has already digitised a considerable number of documents, with more than seven hundred thousand exposures. Its other significant activities over the last five years include adoption of ITeS, setting up of LAN, launching of a very informative website, and renovation of the Archives Building at 6 Bhawani Dutta Lane. As part of generating archival awareness, it has produced two major publications—The Evolution of State Archives (1910—2010), and Rabindranath Tagore in Government Records—and held exhibitions on the same themes, along with one on the Women Revolutionaries of Bengal.



National Service Scheme (NSS) in West Bengal


- The volunteer strength of the NSS in West Bengal has been enhanced from 93,702 to 1,01,200 by the Government of India. A self-financing unit of the NSS has been introduced in West Bengal and 10,100 NSS volunteers have been distributed among various universities and HS councils on a self-functioning basis.
- NSS has been included as an extra academic activity in the curricula of IIT Kharagpur, the West Bengal University of Technology and Bidhan Chandra Krishi Vidyalaya, Kalyani.

- Students from West Bengal also have been selected in International Youth exchange programmes in China, Malaysia, Singapore etc during the last three years.
- Calcutta University received the Indira Gandhi National NSS Award for two consecutive years at New Delhi and some volunteers also received the Indira Gandhi National Award during the last four years.



- Burdwan University, Jadavpur University, Presidency University, Kalyani University, Calcutta University and NSS cell have taken up project during the last two years under **Swachh Bharat Mission** successfully—Life skills enhanced training programme, Youth Leadership and Development project (YLPDP), Youth Club Development Programme (YCDP), cleanliness programs of hospitals, old age homes, religious and historic monuments, adolescent health and tribal youth exchange programmes.
- State Level Youth Conventions have been organised last year. State NSS Award for NSS functionaries have been introduced along the lines of the NSS National Indira Gandhi Award. Awards were given at a befitting function organised by Ramakrishna Ashram, Narendrapur.

- NSS volunteers have given Academic support to 7 Ekalavya Model Residential Schools (EMRS) in the district of Purulia, Bankura, Paschim Midnapore, Burdwan, Dakshin Dinajpur and Jalpaiguri during the academic session 2014–15.
- A separate NSS window has been opened in the Higher Education Department website.



National Cadet Corps (NCC)

The National Cadet Corps came into existence on 15 July 1948. Currently the NCC Directorate in West Bengal and Sikkim has six GP HQs, with 52 Major/Minor units.

The Directorate comprises two Naval Units, two technical Air Squadrons and two flying Air Squadrons, an Independent Girls' Company, an Artillery Battery, an Armoured Squadron, a Composite Unit and an EME Company. For the training year 2015-16, there is a total of 224 Companies and 1 Platoon, 8 Divisions and 8 Flights and 628 Troops with an enrolled strength of 77,095 cadets.

- At the **Inter Directorate Shooting Competition—2015** held at Asansol in August 2015 in which 17 NCC Directorates participated, this Directorate won **2 Gold** and **2 silver** medals and its overall position was **second**.

- At the **West Bengal State Shooting Championship—2015** held at North Calcutta Rifle Club, Kolkata in September 2015, **16 NCC Cadets** of NCC Directorate West Bengal & Sikkim participated and won **1 Gold, 1 Silver** and **2 Bronze** medals.
- At the **Thal Sainik Camp—2015** held at New Delhi in September the Directorate West Bengal & Sikkim participated and secured **first position**, winning **17 medals (9 Gold, 7 Silver, 1 Bronze)**.
- At the **NCC National Games—2015** held in October 2015 the NCC Directorate West Bengal & Sikkim stood **second** winning **3 Gold** and **2 Silver** out of seven sports disciplines.



Promotion of Science




The State is making serious efforts to popularise the pursuit of science at the higher secondary, undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

For the last 200 years or so, West Bengal has always been known as a centre where the sciences have flourished. Whether it is the number of Nobel Laureates that Kolkata has produced or the number of science students and researchers coming out of its educational system, West Bengal leads the way. The State is making serious efforts to popularise the pursuit of science at the higher secondary, undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

In the 28 Government colleges operationalised in the rural and backward regions of the State during 2013-15, 21 have offered science subjects in the very first year of operations; in the rest, the infrastructure for introduction of science subjects is being readied in a phased manner. Also, efforts are underway to revitalise the Jagadis Bose National Science Talent Search (JBNSTS), Kolkata and increasing its mandate to support students and teachers in a study of the sciences.

Jagadis Bose National Science Talent Search (JBNSTS), Kolkata is an autonomous registered Society under Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 (No S/4353 of 1960–61). Promoted and fully funded by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal, JBNSTS was set up to commemorate the birth centenary celebration of Acharya JC Bose. In the last five decades, JBNSTS has become a premier institute of non-formal science education in India. The mandate of JBNSTS is to motivate students to take up science; to identify talented students of basic sciences, engineering and medicine who have the potential to develop into scientists and technologists of high ability; and to nurture them through financial and other support to develop their talents in the field of science and technology.

Senior Scholarship Programme

This is JBNSTS's core programme. Talented first year students of Basic Science/Medicine/Engineering are selected through multi-round, rigorous tests and are awarded scholarships till the completion of their MSc/MBBS/BE degrees. It is the oldest and one of the most prestigious scholarship schemes in India. Apart from Annual Book Grant ₹1,000 per annum selected candidates are awarded a scholarship amount of ₹1,000 per month in case of students of medicine and engineering, till their graduation. Since the DST—INSPIRE Government of India, recognised JBNSTS candidates who are selected from basic science are also entitled to the DST—INSPIRE scholarship & research grant of ₹80,000 (₹60,000 + ₹20,000) per annum till their completion of Masters degree. In 2015, 56 senior scholars have been selected for the award.

Junior Scholarship Programme

Started in 2015, science students of class XI are selected through multiple-round test and provided a scholarship of ₹500 per month for two years to support their higher secondary level study. A book grant of ₹1000 is also awarded to them. In 2015, 102 students have been selected for the junior talent scholarship.

West Bengal District Scheme Programme

The main focus of this programme is to expose the underprivileged but meritorious students of remote areas of the State of West Bengal to the world of science. Residential science workshops are organised for such students where they can interact with the eminent scientists, regular follow up activities are also arranged to motivate them regarding science education. In 2015, 10 schools have been identified from South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas, Nadia and Hooghly for training. Preliminary teachers training is also held to develop the science teaching potential of the teachers of these schools.

Other Programmes

The popularisation of science is also another activity of JBNSTS. This year, it observed the National Science Day in collaboration with West Bengal Science Academy and conducted a Meet the Scientists Programme at Netaji Indoor Stadium from 4 to 6 October at the State Youth Science Fair, 2015, a programme of the Department of Youth Services, Government of West Bengal.

Under CSIR's Talent Enrichment Program, selected scholars of JBNSTS are taken to different research/educational institutes in different parts of India for enriching their research ideas and interdisciplinary exposure to the world of cutting edge research.

Under the Gol's INSPIRE scheme, science camps of duration of five days with the top 1% (based on their Class 10 Board exam results) students of Class XI Science stream of West Bengal are organised. JBNSTS will organise the 50th Science Camp in March 2016.

TEQIP Phase I in West Bengal

TEQIP Phase I in West Bengal was implemented in West Bengal along with other 12 states during the period from January, 2005 to June, 2009. Total 127 institutions were selected from 12 States including 11 institutes from West Bengal. In West Bengal three State funded Universities, four Government Engineering Colleges and four Private Self financing Engineering Colleges, participated in Phase-I. Universities and Government Institutes were provided fund as grants whereas private institutes received fund as long term interest bearing loans. Project Allocation for West Bengal, as approved by Gol, was ₹143.597 crore plus additional fund of ₹3.50 crore. The entire allocated fund has been fruitfully utilised.



Technical Education Quality Improvement Project (TEQIP-II)

Improvement in Teaching, Training and Learning Facilities has been done through introduction of new Postgraduate programmes, modernisation of class rooms, modernisation and strengthening of existing labs, establishment of new labs for existing UG and PG programmes and new PG programmes, modernisation/improvements of supporting departments and libraries, updation of Learning Resources, minor civil works etc.

Providing Teaching and Research Assistantship to increase enrollments in existing and new PG and PhD programmes in Engineering and Applied Science Departments non GATE qualified students selected by the institutions are receiving funds as Teaching and Research Assistantship from the project. Up to October 2015 ₹12.95 crore has been disbursed to 767 MTech students and 18 PhD scholars as assistantship.

Selected institutions are to promote **increased participation of faculty in Research, Research & Development projects and Consultancies**. Institutions that already have PhD programmes should encourage Masters students to join their PhD programmes and also to get associated with industry oriented/sponsored research programmes. Under this 182 Research and Development programmes have been undertaken, 7897 publications, 236 books have been published and 57 patents have been obtained so far.


Faculty and Staff Development has received focus attention under the project. Up to October 2015 ₹8 crore has been utilised towards qualification upgradation, enhancement of subject knowledge, research competence up gradation, participation in seminar conference, international training programmes and pedagogy training for the faculty. Pedagogical training for the TEQIP institutes with the support of IIT Kharagpur. Till date, around 500 faculty members have been trained in Pedagogical and domain knowledge Under International Training Programme a good number of Faculties have attended so far and they have submitted reports on their return.

In each of the project institutions, **Industry-Institute Interaction cell** has been established to increase collaboration with the industries, increase rate of campus placement, increasing industrial training for students, increase in Internal Revenue Generation by collaborating with industry, etc. In Industry-Institute-Interaction (I-I-I) activity institutions are organising collaborative lectures and Conferences in association with Chambers and Industries. MOUs have been signed with nationally recognised organisations and academic institutions of repute. 144 numbers of EOI and MOU have been signed till now under I-I-I cell activities.

Institutional Management Capacity enhancement is being done through specially designed **MCEP** training programs organised at several IIMs for enhancing Managerial & administrative abilities of head of institutes, senior faculties and officials.

Several Institutional reforms have been implemented

- Board of Governors has been formed in all the project institutes in compliance with AICTE and UGC norms. All 14 project institutes have prepared Governance Development Plan with a specific delivery time frame and uploaded the same in their respective websites. All project institutes are conducting regular BOG meetings as per norms and the minutes are uploaded in the website.
- Out of 14 project institutes, at present 7 institutes are **already autonomous** and rest are in the pipeline to achieve autonomy.
- To sustain development activities initiated under TEQIP-II post project closure, all the institutes have established Four Funds vis. Corpus Fund, Staff Development Fund, Depreciation Fund and Maintenance Fund with annual savings of the institutes to strengthen the institute's own financial backbone.



Technical Education Quality Improvement Project (TEQIP-II)

Focused efforts are being made by the institutes to **improve academic performance of SC/ST/OBC, academically weak students** through remedial teaching and soft skill development programmes for increasing transition rate and employability. Diagnostically identified weak students are nurtured for improvement of transition rate through regular programmes organised by the institute. In 2013-14 & 2014-15, 5658 weak students have been nurtured and up to October, 2015 and ₹2.67 crore has been utilised on this account.

In order to bring a parity between quality of Technical education implemented in colleges outside IITs and NITs and that in the premier technical institutes, MHRD has launched **QEEE (Quality Enhancement in Engineering Education)** programme wherein real time and synchronous technology is used to allow for an integration of superior external scholastic inputs into current pedagogical practices. Under the pilot programme for 100 colleges in the country, 6 colleges of this state are tagged and the programme has been found to be very beneficial to the students.



Project Monitoring & Evaluation

The project monitoring and reporting activities are mandatory for the SPFU and all the project institutes. The Project is being monitored through,

- (i) Key Performance Indicator with target values (KPIs)
- (ii) Web based Management Information System (MIS)
- (iii) Web based financial monitoring Report (e-FMR)
- (iv) Web based Procurement Management Support System (PMSS)

Compliance of Project Objectives

The performance of the state in TEQIP-II with reference to 9 Performance Assessment Indicator (5th JRM) is very much encouraging. All the 14 project institutions have achieved all 9 KPI (Key Performance Indicator) parameters. Proactive action of the State in implementing TEQIP-II has been commended at the 5th Joint Review Mission held by MHRD and World Bank.




Initiatives of SPFU-WB in Project Implementation

- (i) State-Private Sector Advisory Group (S-PSAG) has been established in the state in compliance with TEQIP-II guideline to oversee academia-industry partnership activities in various directions. Regular meetings are held to advise the project institutes to strengthen I-I Cell activities.
- (ii) In all project institutes senior academicians have been engaged as mentors and performance auditors to advise institutes and conduct regular performance auditing respectively.
- (iii) Eminent academicians are deputed to supervise the activities of Centres of Excellence established in two universities in order to attain the committed deliverables.
- (iv) To share the good practices established in West Bengal in connection with implementation of TEQIP-II, SPFU team from Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat and Chattisgarh visited the state as per the recommendation of the Gol.
- (v) Due to sincere efforts of SPFU-WB, a MoU was signed between IIT Kharagpur and all 14 participating institutes of the State for pedagogical training of their faculties.






